Our past too may have been barren and full of failure due to our stubbornness and foolishness. That joy is to be our strength—a joy which begins the moment we turn to Him and then multiplies step by step as we go on with Him

We shall study first from God's Word seven reasons for this joy. Then we shall see how it can be experienced, and how it can multiply, and become purer and richer and deeper in us. "The seventy returned again with joy, saying, Lord, even the devils are subject unto us through thy name.....
And he said unto them In this rejoice not, that the spirits are subject unto you; but rather rejoice, because your names are written in heaven" (Luke 10.17, 20).

assurance of being clad and covered by the Lord Himself. "Ye have put on Christ" (Gal. 3.27).

Or we might say: 'Lord, I shall serve Thee gladly after retirement, but certainly not before. Let me get my children married first.

As God reveals Himself to us in a greater measure day by day while we needlast upon His Word, so do we find our joy increasing more and more. Day by day He will give us something fresh as we wait upon Him, and as God's Word becomes real to us, it becomes our joy and strength.

"They departed ... rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name" (Acts 5.41).

When we are counted worthy to suffer shame for the Lord Jesus Christ, instead of being downcast and discouraged we should rejoice, because thus we see Hai glory in a new way, and in that joy we find a new and wooderful strength. In suffering shame for His Name we are promoted to a greater responsibility to serve and honour Him. "If ye be represented for the rame of Christ, happy are ye" (! Pet. 4.1).

Suppose that you were working as an ordinary clerk in an office, and that one day you were undeally promoted to be the head of the department, would you go home and begin weeping to your wife > No, you would veloce that you were counted worthy of such responsibility and had qualified for promotion. Rejoice, then, that you are counted fit to be given the divine responsibility of sufficient perposed for His Name. That is true promotion. As you realise your privilege you will become strong.

May we every one of us learn how to enter into the joy of the Lord, which is our strength.

Somer or later life brings disspointment and hoips are shettered. Your bestlift fails. Berepthing in the whole world around you in which you sought for joy, distpoints you in the call.

The sweet of today will become bitter tomorrow, the finden of today will become the enemy of tomorrow, the wisdom of today will become foolishess tomorrow, the wisdom of today will become foolishess tomorrow, all that you think will give you joy will prove enemy at the last. The Lord Jesus Christ, the living, loving Seviour, who died for sainers, is the only One who give you joy. But the joy He offers you is not earthly joy. It is His own beaventy Joy.

"The kingdom of God is righteousness, and neace, and joy in the Holy Ghost," The Holy Ghost, who comes to dwell within us, works in us abundance of righteousness as God's gift, and that righteousness is the source of our peace and joy. Human righteousness does not bring with it peace or joy because it is based on effort. Men struggle hard to become righteous before God and men, but for all their struggling they become in God's sight filthier every day. What men call righteousness God calls fithy rags (Isa. 64.6). "They being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God" (Rom. 10.3). That is the reason. Whether it be Iswith righteousness, or Hindu righteousness, or Buddhist righteousness, or 'nominal Christian' righteousness. God calls it filthy rags.

And what about the deceptions you practise? You may possess many excellent testimonials. Your headmaster or principal may have writtens: 'So and so is of a very high moral character.' But yow know how often this is only a lie. Teachers and pupils all know it. Your Committee members, your neighbours, friends, and relations may all say what a fine man you are, and you may know how to acquire fine testimonials from any employer: or any pastor or prescher of any nationality. But what does God think of you?—the Holy God, who is a consuming fir. How will your certificates appear before Him? Does not your own conscience tell you every day that you are guilty, guilty? Do not listen to the good

reports of others. Listen to your own conscience, and you will be made to see the things which you have done in secret, years ago meybe, in some corner or room, or under some tree. What kind of thoughts come into your mind when you go to both, or while wailing your mind when you go to both, or while wailing you are. Learn to listen to you are. Learn to state any more time in triving to establish your own rightcouncest.

God is ready to give you His rightnounness as the ree gift of His love. Can your father or mother, brother or sister, hashand or wife give you such a love. Ye Event though they were to try, they could not do it, for they have not the capacity to give such a love. Yet God of extensity offers you such a love. He adds peace to love and multiplies it by cternity. That is His erace!

And to that love and peace. He adds joy by the Holy Spirit. Man cannot give to you that joy either, nor can you receive it by human effort. When sin came into the world through one man's disbedelence, it brought with it a cure, and because of the cures thorns and thintice, barrenness and dispondement are everywhere. They are a picture of the beart and lift of man in sin. Whatever a man may send to do through his own advancement and culture, it only ends in thorns and thinties and desert sand.

There have been many earthly kingdoms and empires, and all have ended in failure, defeat and shame. Where are now all those famous kings and philosophers who once hosated in their wealth and wisdom? Every work of men must be brought to naught. Beautiful buildings. even though builded of stone, end in hesps of ruins. Cleverly designed engines and machines all break down one day. Human relationships end in strife, bitterness and batred. Children rebel against parents. Relations become ungrateful for kindnesses shown. In every home there are thorns and thistles. Can you tell me of any home where there is no strife, or quarrel, or batred, or jeslousy between brother and sister, and mother-in-law and danghter-in-law? Can you tell me of any country where there is no corruption, or immorality? Even men of high position give and take bribes. The marks of the curse of sin are seen in every nation and every country.

God made mass in His own image. He gave the first mass a wonderful body, perfect in every detail. Then sin came, and now you can see the marks of sin on every face. Some faces may look very beautiful and sweet for a time, but watch the secret life, and you will see the marks of sin in pride, greed, vasily and lust, Thus in the eyes of God the life of man is nothing but a desert, full of sand, thoras, thistles and barrenness.

O mant before you take pride in yourself and your doings, learn to see yourself as do deser you-that your life in nothing but a desert watte which cannot be charged or improved by any man. Then see what Cod's Word says: "The desert shall blossom as the rone... It shall blossom abundantly, and rejolor with joy sed singing." This is the misscle of the grate of God. So even in the same way, even those who should be your friends may turn against you when you go wrong, But by coming back to your Leed, and doing His will, you are washed and Engives and covered. Thus you you can again be used by Him; and your heart will be filled with the great loy of restored communion and answered toware.

"Nevertheless David took the stronghold of Zion: the same is the city of David. ... So David dwelt in the fort, and called it the city of David" (2 Sam. 5.7, 9a).

The day when David conquered Zion was another occasion for rejoicing. Joshua had falled to drive out the Jebusites from Zion. These began to mock at David, but by God's grace and strength he drove them out. Yes, the day when he did so was a hapov day

for him, because then he began to see something more of the purpose of God in choosing him. He began to see something of God's heavenly plan for his people, and how it could not be accomplished while the Jebusites remained in Jerusalem.

God, who had sent the ten plagues on Egypt, and had made the walls of Jericho fall, had depended upon the people to drive out the seven nations from the land of Camsan. It was part of the heavenly plan that they abould be driven out only by God's people who had come out of Egypt. God had power to send fire from heaven to consume and judge these people if He wished to do so. What He did at Jericho, could He not repeat at the Jebusite stronghold? But God did not itsepeat to the Jesus the standard to use such means. He had chosen His people to be His co-workers and partners in indement.

Have you fully realised that God relies upon you, this people, so fullil His baseauth plant? But we fail God all along! Rather than obey God, and cut off of "Jobusies", we make marriage with them and allow them to remain in our midst. That is how so many unconverted men have become pasterns, elders, committee members, eren bishops. How many born again women there are who have married "jebusites" for the sake of money, or education, or colour, or highest Or how many born-sign men, who for the sake of a few thousand rupees downy, will marry a will assure a few of a few thousand rupees downy, will marry a dod a curse amough the proph of God. For about four hundred years, God's purpose was hindered because of such behaules. They had to be driven out

completely. Thank God for the wisdom He gave to David at this time.

We are told that he conquered Zion and that from that day he called it the city of David. "And David went on, and grew great, and the Lord God of hosts was with hir." (verse to). Bven so, his joy was not wet full.

When believer refuse to compromise with unspiritual men or be united with those who are not born again, it means that they have begun to see what such as the Jebusites have done to hinder the purpose of God. It is a happy day for all believers when they see that they must be separated from all that is of the world and of the old life, and realise that God is relying upon them to fulfill file heavenly plan. Yet even that discovery is, so we shall see, but a bezianine.

"So David bought th. threshingfloor and the oxen for fly thehelt of silver. And David built there an altarunto the Lord, and offered burnt offering and peace offerings. So the Lord was intreated for the land, and the slague was naved from Invatil" (3 Sam. 24.24b, 24).

There was still another happy day in David's history, when God brought him to the threshing-floor of Aramanh the Jebusite. He had been tempted to number the people, and although God had been thewing mixedes in fighting for him, he began to count his mighty men, as though his strength depended on them and on the size of his army. So God had to pushib him, and he respected at the threshing-floor

of Araunah the Tebusite.

It had been a very grirous sin, but God had forgiven him, and that is why it was such a happy day in David life. Is it not a very happy day in your life, when God forgives you some grirous sin done in billion of obedience to His will? Oh how gracious and merciful our God is! How great are His tender merciful our God is! How great are His tender merciful or even though we fall Him so grievously, yet he is willing to forgive.

That was a happy day for David, and the same God gives us all similar happy days. The very spot where David was punished became the site of God's House. "Then Solomon began to build the house of the Lord.

....where the Lord appeared unto David his father...
in the threshing-floor of Ornan the Jebusite" (2 Chron.
3.1). From that day David's true joy began. He had
had happy days, wonderful days, but nothing compared
to the joy he found there at the altar, on the site for
the termile of God.

"Take heed none; for the Lord hath chosen these to build an house for the sanetwary: be strong, and do it. Then David gave to Solomon his ton the pattern of the porch, and of the house thereof. ... All this, said David, the Lord made me understand in owiting by his hand upon me, etem all the works of this pattern" (1 Chron. 28.10, 11, 10).

God was now able to give to David the pattern for His temple, and the assurance that his son had been chosen of God to build it. The joy that David now experienced was an entirely different kind of joy. It was the joy that comes with the revelation of the heanearly plan for the house of God. The king rejoiced and the people rejoiced also. Yet David could not have rejoiced as he did now without going through all those other experienced. Every stage was necessary. We want you also to come right through into this final experience of joy.

The joy of the Lord is your strength, but the joy of the revelation of the heavenly pattent, and of knowing that God has called us to thate in it, supersociet all other joys that you may have experienced on other occasions. In this joy you enter into the plan and purposes of God regarding His people, both now and in the ages to come. Pary then that the Lord will lead you on from joy to joy, till you come to the fulness of the joy of the Lord which is your strength.

"As for God, his way is perfect" (Psalm 18.30).

FOR EARTHLY things we require earthy windon but for spiritual things we require spiritual windom. We see that everything that is of God is perfect and orderly. "His way is perfect." Whatever God does is perfect, entire, complete and holy, and the wants to bring you and me also into a perfect way, as He has promised in verse \$2 of the same Pashin: He maketh my seep perfect." We shall see how His divine laws will make our joy full and complete.

God always looks at the end from the beginning. Whetever He may be doing in the present, He is also keeping His eyes on the end-"declaring the end from the beginning" (iss. 46.10). This is something that we human beings cannot easily understand, but if we win patiently, God Himself will teach us. Our need to be tou taught of God is very great. From the very beginning David was fail of wisdom. He was 'prudent in matters, and concely person'. That was said of him in his youth. For God had begun to train David in secret piaces as he followed and cared for the sheep. Yet he had to wait many years to know God's mind Beun though he was very wise when compared with other young men in his town or in his town or in his country, and even though he had every envisible qualification and was a man of war, and was endowed with wisdom and strength and beautry, yet it took God many years to show him why He had loved him and chosen him.

That is how the Lord Jesus deals with each one of us. The secret of all His dealings with us is His boundless low. Whoever you may be, though you may have lived in sin, and though your way of life may have been shameful, God loves you and desires to cleanse and renew you. Maybe we as human

beings have failed to show fore to you by smilling and shaking hands and so on, but our failness will not change God's love for you. We tell you, from God's Word and with God's stantienty, that the loves you, God He loves you with an everlating love! Even though you may have been rejecting Him and grisring Him all these years, He loves you enough to give you His own

Your father may say: 'No hope for you, my son'.
Your mother may say in despair: 'All my hopes for

you are shattered. Your brothers and sixters may be ashamed and refuse to own you because of your sinful life. Even preachers may say: 'That man has absolutely no hope of being saved'. Yet our Lord will never give you up. There is still hope for you.

However deep you have gone into sin, however low you may have fallen morally, however stubborn you may have been in past years, the love of God is able to save you. "He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him. (Heb. 7.25).

This is the mystery—that you with all your shamela past can become God's co-worker. This is the miracle of His love, and it is because that love is so great that you need so long a time to discover its full meaning. He shows your limitation, but He lover you, and His intention is to lead you to that state in which He wants you to be. But you must allow God to prepare you, to train you for that service, that ministry for which He has called you.

When God first chose David, there was no doubt much joy in the whole family. The father, mother, brothers, were all overjoyed because of Samuel's announcement. Yet as a family they could think of no more than earthly kingship. They may have thought that they would gain advantage and privilege by reason of David's position. But it was not for a mere earthly kingdom that God was calling David. He had for him a kinsdom far higher and greater than that.

We have seen the growth of joy in David's life, stage by stage, and we have seen what it was that gave both to God and to David the greatest satisfaction, even the revelation to him of God's plan and pattern for His temple. Now we want to understand something of the training that led up to that.

Before God could reveal His plas to him, He hal, as we have seen, to bring David by a path of sorrow to the threshingthour of Arausah, the Jebusite. I will take it; sure!—I'll be very happy to do sol' But God will not accept anything which has cost you nothing.

Remember the price that David had already paid at that very same threshing-floor. A threshing-floor is the place where you separate the whest from the chaff. At the beginning of his life all were asying what a wise ann David was, but throughout his history, there often appeared little else but chaff in his brain. He thought he was full of wisdom, but through his failures does aid to him: 'Look at the chaff.' Only after being brought to many 'threshing-floors,' was David's brain delivered from the chaff. Though he was a king be had to be rebuked by God many times, and had to pay a great price for deliverance.

We have all of us to pay a heavy price to be God's servants. We have to be prepared to be delivered from our chaff, and first of all from the chaff in our brins! What is the chaff? God brought David to his senses and in I Chronicles 15 be gathered the Levites to carry up the ark of God to that same spot purchased from the Jebusite. What a happy day it was for David!

With great joy and gladness they brought up the ark after many years of wandering. "And David spake to the chief of the Levites to appoint their brethren to be the singers with instruments of munick, pasheries and harps and cymbals, sounding, by lifting up the voice with joy" (1 Chron. 15.16). It was a time of great to joy—with singers insignic right from the heart on that day of gladness and David himself joining in the celebration (see 75).

Thus David had to learn two lessons before God allowed him to have the jey of brigging the ark to in right place. Firstly, he had to learn that his brain must be completely free from all chalf and straw to make room for the wiszlom of God. Secondly, he had to learn that the divine order for God's house must be very strictly and thoroughly maintained. JOY IN GIVING "I delicht to do thy will. O wy God"

(Pealm 40.8).

STRENGTH IS the secret of physical growth. The
joy of the Lord which is our real strength in all our
circumstances and experiences and responsibilities, is the
secret of true snightal growth.

As an example we take a new-born baby. That child grows and develops, but is still a baby for the first row pears of his life. Then he catees the second stage of childhood; from there he passes into boybood, stars his school life and learns many things. Pinally he passes out of school and college into young manhood. Now he is able to understand more shoot life through his various experiences and is able to bear more responsibility in home life, or business life, or autional affairs.

Our spiritual life can be divided into the same stages. We begin that life as a spiritual babe, born again of the Holy Spirit when we repeat of our size and believe on the Lord Jesus Christ as our Savioux. Of course Ged does not want us always to be bebes. Yet diss it is quite possible to remain a spiritual bebe for many years instead of for only a few months and, and to say, many do. So often it is those who have a poor beginning and a weak foundation who

make slow spiritual growth. But God wants every one of His children to come to full growth and responsibility.

God's intention is that you should grow daily, and quickly move on force not extegs to another. A you quickly move on force not extegs to another. All you so you have a growing hunger to be in His presence of so you have a growing hunger to be in His presence of his parents, so as God's child you long to be in His presence, so as God's child you long to be in His presence, and it, is by spending time with God that you grow in the knowledge of Him.

As we begin to delight in the Lord, we begin to have a real pleasure in doing His will. "I delight to do thy will, O my God!" (Psalm 40.8). The desire to know and to be well-pleasing to the Lord only comes as we make spiritual progress. Sometimes the Lord keeps us waiting months or years to know His will, and as we wait we learn valuable lessons. We learn how to exercise the authority of His Name; we learn to understand the hidden mysteries of His Word; and from this we pass on to the place where we are willing to suffer shame for Him. As we go through all these experiences we grow into spiritual manhood, and that means that we are ready to bear the spiritual responsibility that God has for us and is waiting to share with us. In just the same way as we have national and family responsibilities. so God also wants us to bear spiritual responsibilities both here on earth and in heavenly places also.

We have already seen that God chose David for a great purpose. We have followed the outline of his life and seen the stages by which he progressed in the joy of the Lord. In all those experiences he was gaining knowledge. He had to pass through all those stages of growth before God could give him full charge and spiritual responsibility.

Recall them again. Remember how God trained David in secret places, as he followed the sheep, until one day Samuel, conscious of a divine charge as God's prophet, came to anoint him king. It is impossible for God to choose and anoint us till we have been thoroughly seated and proved.

Later David learnt to fight the Lord's battles in His Name and the believer also will have to learn how to use by faith the spiritual weapons that the Lord has provided for him (2 Cor. 10.4.).

Again we saw how David joined hands with the Philistines, and how, in his folly in not first finding out the full will of God for himself and his people, he lost all. But in the next chapter we find him recovering all his losses by the very weapons with which he had praviously falled. In the same way there are many enemies of God and of His Word whom we cannot defeat unless we learn to discover the will of God and do it. We can light the Lord's battle, and even use spiritual weapons, and the control of God and the second of the control of the control of God when the the control of God we shall know

Then David defeated and drove out the Jebusses from Jerusalem, bringing to an end their occupation of Zion. This reminds us that in the same way we must have no alliance with the things of the world. or their practice, or their idolatry. We may win many victories, but if in this matter we fail to keep the charge given by God, the result will be hindrance of spiritual growth, and many tears. It is because of the "lebusites" in our spiritual life that the purpose of God is hindered in the world. It is because of "Jebusites" in the church of God that many are defiled and led astray. That is why the work of God cannot proceed freely, and unless these Jebusites are put away, there can be no progress or giving of the Lord Jesus Christ His rightful place as King. It was only because of David's obedience to God's Word that he was enabled to be victorious, and to secure the stronghold of Zion for the Lord. We as God's co-workers should drive out the Jebusites, come what may. There cannot be any union between light and darkness.

David had also to be delivered from worddy windom. We saw how it switchly windom and pride he began to mumber the army and to reckon the strength of the people. So God had to punish him, and it was on the threshing-floor of Arsusahs the Jebusite that David repented and God forgave him. We too, if we sat via worldy windom and self-will, will be judged of God, but if we cooffess our ain and repers, we shall be thewn God's wonderful underlying purpose, even as David, as "October 10 to the Conference of the Confere

Like David too we must learn to carry out God's commands in His appointed way, or there will be

disaster. David's own plan for bringing the ark into the house of God brought only faiture and sorrow, but when he followed the divine instructions there was great joy and rejoicing for the whole nation.

Finally, the most wonderful day for David was when God committed to him in detail the whole Whitern for the temple (1 Chron, 28.19). God could not have revealed this to him at the beginning of his life, even though he was such a mighty, wise and skilful man naturally. Even after he had killed the giant Gulisth, God still had to wait for David to grow spiritually before He could give him this revelation. Many people to-day socak of 'the Church' or 'the Body of Christ' very freely, but very few really understand the meaning of these words. Very few understand God's true thought for the Church. In spite of their 'spiritual' talk many show by the strife and jealousy in their lives that they do not really know that which they profess to know. The purpose of God is to reveal His power and wisdom to principalities and powers in heavenly places as it is expressed in the followship of the Church (Eph. 3.10). The fuiness of God is to be contained and expressed in the Church, and no Christian simply as an individual cen fulfil such a calling and purpose.

battles that was dedicated towards the beautifying of the House of God. In all his many experiences David was . gathering material for the temple. When Saul was chosen to be king, he was crowned at once without any training, but it resulted eventually in his rejection by God because of his stubbornness and blindness; but when God brought David to the throne, he had already undergone many hardships and trials. It was these which qualified him for the throne. In spite of David's failures, God did not forsake him, but went on rebuking and chastening and training and preparing him for His highest purpose-If you are not born again, then, like Saul, you can never enter the work of God or have a share in the kingdom. Saul was rejected completely from the throne. and so will you be. But if, on the other hand, you are a child of God and have begun to walk in obedience to Him, then God will never leave you until He has given you the full, clear pattern, even as He gave it to David. The details of that pattern were of heavenly origin, because the temple was not for man's use, nor to attract man's attention, nor to show forth any man's skill. Every dimension, every material, even the windows and doors and colours were to show forth the glory of God by displaying, in type, the Lord Jesus Christ in His Church. The Church is not an earthly building, built for man's habitation, where money is collected and lectures are

given. It is a spiritual building in which is to be revealed the love of God in Christ for man's salvation.

At last, after many years of experience and training. David had come to a position of spiritual responsibility for the vision of God's house, and could say, 'Nlow I know thy God has chosen me'. Now at length he could show the pattern of the temple to the saties, and thus hare with his son and those with him the responsibility God had had upon jain. God created man perfect and planned that he should reign. But because sin entered into the world, David bad to fight many battles and to defeat Goliath, the Philistines, the Tebusites-and then out of the spoil of these battles to gather the materials for the building of the temple. Our Lord Jesus Christ, by fighting one battle on the Cross has dealt with sin and defeated our enemy for all time, and has also provided in Himself all the material He needs for the building and beautifying of God's house. Yet there remains a difference between the old creation and the new. When God made the earth He spake, and it was so. To-day if He so desired He could bring the new creation to perfection er once; but He is calling young and old, men and women, all types of people of all ages and ranks and nations, and saving to them. Now we want to spells of the ultimate goal towards which these experiences of the joy of the Lord are leading us. The above verse indicates at once that the object of all His dealings with us is fellowship with Himself. That goal sewards which He is drawing us on step by step, so that we cannot draw back, is the highest loy of perfect oneness and union with our Lord.

In these days of wickedness, corruption and sin, very few people know the spiritual meaning of human married life, and that is why we find in many homes unhappiness, strife, misery and sorrow. This is seen even in the married lives of those who are born again. In some cases it is an open secret, in other cases it is a family secret, but in any case you have got to admit that there are very few who enjoy the bliss of married life. This is because they have failed to understand from the beginning of their married life God's thought and purpose for them in bringing them together. Some people think of married life in terms of lust; others in terms of the gold and silver they will get by the dowry; others again in terms of furnished houses, or food, or clothing, and yet others in terms of comfort, or of children or of having authority over their wives; and that is why we find that so many persons, though born again, have missed the joy of married life. They have missed the toy because they have never discovered the laws of that life. All such are compelled to try and give their own meaning when they read in the Bible the words beide and bridegroom'.

But the Bible says: 'the bridegroom rejoices over the bride'. That speaks of the pure joy that rises only from a fellowship of life which is the gift of God. We need only to remind ourselves of an instance or two from the Word of God, and then we shall see for ourselves what is God's thought for married life,

"It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him an help meet for him" (Gen. 2.18).

Let us look first at Adaps and Eve. God's purpose in giving Eve to Adam as a companion was for fellow-ship. God wants us all to have that true fellowship. This word fellowship is unique word in the Bible and no one can truly understand it who is not born again. The fellowship with the Father and the Son is whelly and solely and entirely for those who have received new life from Him, and who shide with Him and in Him for ever and ever. That is how we define the low of God. It is the life of God flowing into us and our life from Him, the God. The contract God. I have seen persons who have lived a very happy married life together for many years. When I asw them first, they did not in the least resemble each other, but after many years of married life, they seem to be more like twins than husband or wife. There is so much likeness between them because of that happy union. If this is true of earthy married life, how much more it can be with regard to your union and intimacy with your Lord which is cternal.

This then is the Lord's final goal for us. When God made Eve out of Adam, the scripture says, He took only a piece of rib from Adam, and from that tiny rib he made Eve like Adam in form and nature. So much alike were they that if you had seen them

that day you would have perhaps said that they were brother and sister, because they were both made in the image of God.

Yet could there have been any comparison between the tiny bone which God took out of Adam and the woman He brought to him as his wife? Imagine God taking out the piece of bone and holding that before Adam in its uncompleted state! Could be have had fellowship with that piece of bone? But God breathed upon it, and fashioned it and it became Eve, the very counterpart of Adam. And we, before we are born again, are just like that dry bone. Whoever you may be, if you are not yet born again, you are no more than that small dry bone, full of every kind of weakness and infirmity and shortcoming, and not having the least resemblance to the divine likeness. Indeed you are morse because of the sin which has marred us and made us ugly and which had not yet touched Adam. In our ruined and defiled state, we are like that dry piece of bone which came out of Adam. Yet His high purpose for us is that we may be fashioned like unto Him, and He is willing and able to transform us till we are so conformed to the image of His Son. As God affirms in I Corinthians 13: 12, and I John 3: 2, me shall be like Him. It is hard on earth to understand such a truth, such a purpose, but it is indeed going to be so

Now God is saying to us: 'As the bridegroom sejectes over the bride, I will rejoice over thee.' The word "bride" in the Bible speaks of the most intimate fellowship and relationship that can ever exist between two persons, because what husband and wife can give to and receive from each other is something that can mere be exchanged between other persons. What husband and wife on give to each other cannot be given by mother or brother or sister, or in any other relationship. In a way that is equally unique there can be deep mystical union between man and God that even the angels in heaven cannot experience, because they cannot receive the divine love which He gives to man. That is the marved of redemption.

Now let us imagine a cultured and good-hooking man, marrying a plain, dest-completioned and unershured girl and doing so of his own choice solely because of the love he has for her. He marries her, not for any computation that is upon him but solely because of his pure inward love for her. She may be at bleck as cost, and she may be the most ugly woman in the whole town, but that man can give to her when the could not give to anybody dete, because their marriage is based upon a true inward love and winton.

In a similar way God can give to you and me a divine love that the angles can never receive or appreciate. He may give the angles wisdom; He may give them power and might; He may give them many tasks to perform in heaven; but He cannot give them? His deep, redeeming, everlasting love. We say this with all reviences and by the suthering of God, because the value of to come is not to be governed by angets, but by men who are now redeemed by His Blood. As Hebrews 2: 9-8 tells us, the world is not going to be in subjection to the angets, but to men.

What was it that compelled the Lord Iesus to give His body to be broken? The answer is in John 3.16: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish". The love of God was seeking for fellowship and companionship-for friends to be with Him for ever-and so that love found expression by being noured out on the cross. When you are born again, God pours that same love upon you and rejoices over you. You go to Him one day as one among His redeemed Church, His prepared Bride that is destined to receive His love and joy and to satisfy His heart, even as Eve was given to Adam to be a companion. a friend, a partner, and to satisfy his innermost longings and share with him what he could not enjoy with the birds, trees or animals.

"Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to him: for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and his wife hath made herself ready" (Rev. 19.7).

It is with such love as that of which we have been speaking that God now is calling you. That is why in Revelation 21 the Church is compared to a bride adorsed for her husband—a bride prepared to receive in fulness the love and joy and wisdom of God and the very heart secrets of her Lord.

Of course at the beginning of human married life the husband and wife do not yet understand one another fully. The wife may be able to say many things to her husband, but she dare not as a bride tell him of certain things which can only be spoken of after many months or years of understanding one mother. But as they together obey the divine laws, and as mutual trust and confidence increase, she will be able to tell him all

The time is coming when we will be able to tell our Lord everything, and He will be able to tell us everything. Some say that if the husband gives the whole month's selary to his wife it is a sign of true love, but when you go to beaven the Lord will share everything with you without any compulsion, and yet you will be also be in subjection to Him throughout extensity.

Now do you understand why your Lord wants you to be His? Now do you understand why He is calling you, loving you and disciplining you? It is even that He may rejoice over you with heavenly rejoicing, and that you may have an intimacy with God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost that the suggle can never how. It is that you may enjoy the sweetest love through all eternity—that you may know the great joy of being loved with a heavenly. regrlassing love.

Why refuse such a love, when all the heavenly powers are waiting to see God's glory and beauty in you and God wants you to be the object of His delight and affection? Please receive Him with that object, that the loy of the Lord may indeed be your strength, and that He may reporte over you with singing. Will you not allow Him to bring wou into that eniowment.

Now we shall see from Isaiah 62 what our Lord

Your friends and neighbours may admire you, and tell you that you are so good and kind and pure. Yet even by human standards you know that it is not true, and if you were to be examined by the heavenly powers, how would you stand? How will that 'righteousness' of yours ever compare to the righteonaness He gives?

"And the Gentiles shall see thy righteourness, and all hings thy glory: and thou shalt be called by a new name, which the mouth of the Lord shall name" (Isa. 62.2). God reveals His standard in t Coristhians 1.30. "Chair Josu... in made unto su... nightecounces". He Himself is our rightecounces no. 8 he himself is our rightecounces. No man on earth could find some believals in Him. He was the only Person of whom we can say that He had no sin and knew no sin, and even in heaven He is supereme above all the cherubian and scraphian. It is His rightecounces which we receive through that in His finished work, and that is why other people who, are full of criticisms cannot find fault in it. For this rightecounces is no be caponed and displayed to-day. "The Gentlies shall see ..." If the beaventy powers are that the rightecounces no be ground for noes to find fault in you now, "For as many of you as have been beprized into Christ have put on Christ" (Gal. 3.27).

"But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make are provision for the fiels, to fulfill the busts thereof 'Com. 13.14). Just as our skin covers the muscles undernessh, the very rightenumens of the mighty Savious covers as when we receive Him. We offer that to you now with God's authority. He makes us fit for His heavenly calling and when the work of the Holy Spirit has been perfected in our faithful walk on earth, we shall see the honour and glory waiting for us in heaven, (Luke 10.17) Many a saint just before his death has seen something of heaven, and when his relations are weeping because he is about to pass away, then it is the dying man who begins to comfort them. 'Do not weep for me,' he says.
'I see heaven open and the angels ready to receive me'. Others around him may not see, but the one who is about to be called by the Lord into heaven is given new eyes to see heavenly things. Some have actually heard the angels singing before their death. Some, with shining face, declare that they see the Lord Issus and though in great physical pain, enter already into the low of their Lord
